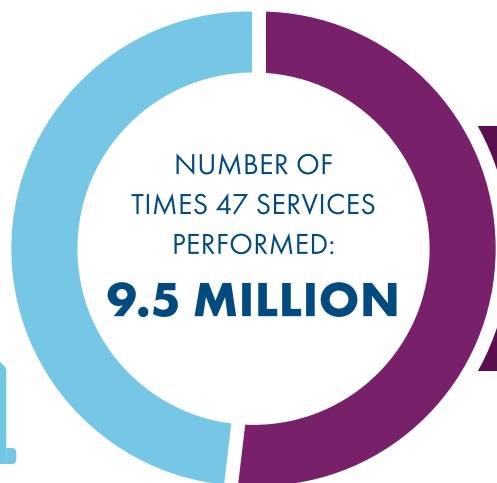
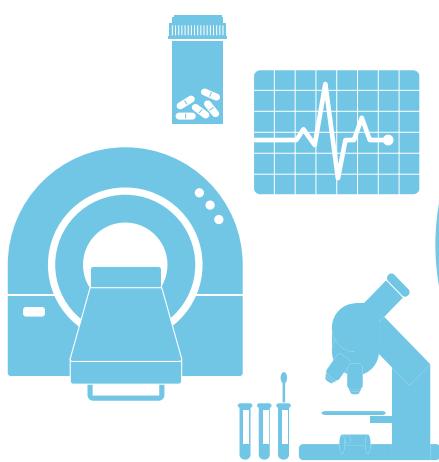


More Isn't Always Better

WASHINGTON PATIENTS RECEIVE THOUSANDS OF TESTS AND PROCEDURES EACH YEAR THAT MAY NOT BE NECESSARY AND MAY CAUSE HARM

A recent Alliance report using insurance claims of 4 million people in Washington from 2014-2017 looked at 47 health services that doctors and experts say are often unnecessary.

Overuse – The tests, treatments, or procedures that were determined to be likely inappropriate or unnecessary given the patient's circumstances.

SOME MEDICAL SERVICES CAN DO MORE HARM THAN GOOD

For some patients, the potential for **physical, emotional, and financial harm** resulting from some screenings, diagnostic testing, and pre-operative tests outweighs the benefits.



OVERUSE TRANSLATES TO MILLIONS OF DOLLARS WASTED

Research shows that between 25 to 30% of the total cost of health care comes from unnecessary care that has little value.



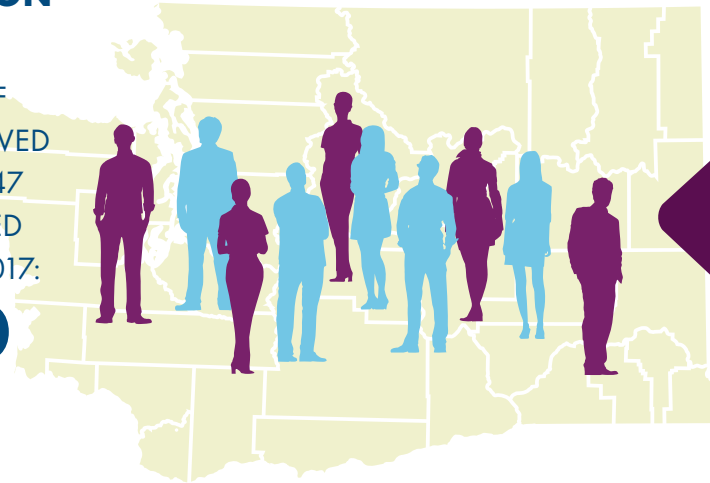

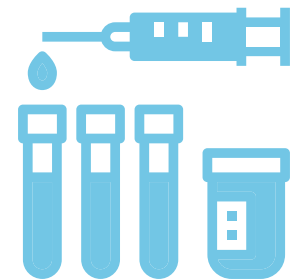

TOP AREAS OF UNNECESSARY CARE

More than **90% of the overuse** found in this study was attributed to just a few tests, procedures, and treatments, including:

- Opiates prescribed for acute low back pain in the first four weeks
- Annual cardiac screening for low-risk individuals
- Antibiotics prescribed for acute upper respiratory and ear infections
- Pre-operative lab studies prior to low-risk surgery for low-risk individuals
- Eye imaging tests for patients without significant eye disease
- Too frequent screening for cervical and prostate cancer and Vitamin D deficiency

- 1.** Why is this test or procedure necessary?
- 2.** What are the downsides?
- 3.** Are there simpler, safer options?
- 4.** What happens if I do nothing?
- 5.** How much does it cost?
